NOTES FROM THE DESK OF THE POLICE CHIEF

Investigating Crime

Video surveillance cameras are a great crime fighting tool. If you have a surveillance camera outside of your home or business, we would appreciate access when investigating a crime. You may register your camera with Detective Cpl. Cummins at 215-822-1910.

Reporting Suspicious Behavior

If you see suspicious people in your neighborhood please call 911. A Police Officer will be dispatched to investigate the complaint.

Courteous and Safe Driving

• Slow Down

Citizen reports of speeding vehicles are a common complaint. Please slow down on our roads. Be mindful of crosswalks, construction zones and school bus-

es. It is our duty as motorists to be courteous and safe when driving.

Respect Yellow Lights

Remember that the intent of a yellow light is to notify drivers to slow down and prepare to stop. A yellow traffic signal should not be viewed as a sign to step on the gas to rush through an intersection before the light turns red.

• Come to a Complete Stop

When you see a stop sign or a red light, it's important to bring your vehicle to a complete stop, even if you think no other vehicles are coming.

• Do Not Text and Drive

It is never acceptable to send text messages when operating a motor vehicle. It is also against the law.

• Obey Speed Limits

When driving, it's important to stick to the posted speed limit at all times. The restrictions placed on vehicle speed are not established arbitrarily. Rather, they are carefully selected to maximize safety for drivers and for individuals in the homes, businesses and other organizations in the areas where roadways are located.

Make Adjustments for Weather

When the weather is less than perfect, such as rainy, snowy or foggy conditions, take extra precautions when driving and follow recommended guidelines for staying safe in inclement weather.

Act 53

Act 53 enables parents to obtain a court order to force children

under the age of 18 into drug treatment as a last resort.

Lock Car Doors

Theft from unlocked vehicles is a continuing problem. Thieves have been breaking into unlocked cars, looking for valuables that are easily removed. Residents should always lock parked vehicles, even if it is parked on the street in front of your home or even in your driveway. Simply locking your doors can prevent theft.

<u>Scam</u>

If someone contacts you and advises you to go to a store and purchase gift cards to pay an outstanding bill this is a sure indication that the request is a fraud. No utility companies or government agencies collect payments in this manner.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FROM THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

ROAD OBSTRUCTIONS

When obstructions are placed on Township Roads, they can cause problems with traffic, drainage, snow removal, road paving, and maintenance of public streets.

Per Township Ordinance #97-11-01, obstructions such as basketball nets, trash containers, and recycling bins CANNOT be erected over or placed in any portion of a Township Road. Those responsible will be ticketed by Police.

SNOW REMOVAL REMINDERS

With Winter almost upon us, we remind you of the Snow Removal process in New Britain Township:

- * The Public Works Department is responsible for salting and plowing all Township-owned roadways and facilities.
- Salting begins soon after snow starts to fall.
 Plowing commences after an accumulation of at least 2 inches of snow.
- * With larger storms, roadways will be plowed several times during the course of the event.
- It takes an average of 6 to 8 hours for the Public Works Department to plow all Township roads after the snowfall has ended. Please be patient!
- Please remove all obstacles from the edge of the roadway (i.e. basketball hoops, trash cans, etc.).
- * DO NOT put trash can containers or recycling bins in the street, as they will get hit by the plow.
- * Make sure your mailbox is at least 6 inches back from the curb and has 4 inch numbers on each side of the mailbox.
- * The Township Snow Ordinance requires you to remove your vehicle from the roadway after one (1) hour of continuous snowfall. Do not place it back in the street until after the road has been completely cleared.
- * If you have any concerns with plowing of the Township Roads, you can call the Township

Administration Building at 215-822-1391. DO NOT stop the plow trucks to speak with the individual who is plowing/salting the Township Road. It is the driver's responsibility to clear the roadways for public safety.

WINTER DRIVING TIPS

- * Always use headlights during inclement weather.
- * Allow extra time to get where you are going.
- Keep your gas tank full at all times.
- Clear snow and ice completely from all sides of your vehicle before driving.
- * Maintain a distance of at least six car lengths behind a snow plow.
- * Do not pass a snow plow. Plow blades are wider than the truck.
- * When traveling in bad weather, maintain at least twice the normal following distance.
- * Be safe by remaining alert at all times.

WHERE CAN YOU FIND INFORMATION ON NEW BRITAIN TOWNSHIP?

New Britain Township strives to provide residents with information as soon as it is available pertaining to projects within the Township, such as road closures, declared states of emergency, and more. The newsletter is a great source of information but it is limited due to having only three circulations per year. Limitations also exist when it comes to sending out public letters of notification that, typically, only go to residents within 500 feet of a project. Neither of these methods can account for an emergency situation. The Township uses other, quicker, avenues to convey information to the public as it becomes available. These include:

HELPFUL HINTS FOR BETTER STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

MAINTAINING GRASS DRAINAGE SWALES

A grass drainage swale is an open channel that collects water from hard surfaces and allows it to percolate into the ground. Swales can help to increase water filtration, decrease water flow velocity, prevent erosion, and direct runoff during storms into other stormwater facilities or the storm drain system.

The following is a list of ways to maintain your swale:

Monthly-

- Inspect your swale after all storms: check that water has drained and that there is no erosion.
- Remove sediment and debris from in and around the swale.

Seasonally-

- Mow fescues and bluegrasses no shorter than
 2.5 to 3 inches. Remove tall clippings.
- Manually remove weeds or invasive plants.
- * Remove leaves in the fall:

they may smother grass and block the flow of water.

 Adjust the mower height to avoid scalping the edges of the side slopes.

As Needed-

- * Reseed any bare areas.
- Contact the DEP if you continue to have problems.

Never-

- Use fertilizers or pesticides in the swale.
- * Over-mow, or mow shorter than 2.5 to 3 inches.
- * Mow immediately after rain.

DE-ICING DRIVEWAYS AND SIDEWALKS

As snow piles up in the winter, we often turn to salt to melt the snow and ice. Salt, however, adversely impacts the environment, especially our streams. Excess salt can saturate and destroy the soils natural structure and result in more erosion to our water - ways. A high concentration of salt can damage and kill vege-

tation. Salt poses the greatest danger to fresh water ecosystems and fish. Excess salt can seep into groundwater and stormwater runoff. Effective ice control can help prevent excess salt runoff to our waterways.

Because all deicers can be harmful to the environment when applied in excess, the best strategy is to reduce the use of these chemicals as much as possible.

Below are some rules to follow:

- * Shovel sidewalks and pathways to keep them clear and to prevent ice from forming. Remember, salt and deicers are not effective when more than three inches of snow have accumulated.
- Consider the temperature.
 Salt is less effective when the temperature is below 25 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Only use deicers when a storm is about to come through.
- Reduce use of deicers by adding sand for traction.

Apply the least amount of deicer or salt to get the job done.

HOW YOU CAN HELP

In addition to being mindful of your own activities that can pollute stormwater, keep an eye out for what others are doing. Ask questions on any issue that may impact your water source. Notices about hearings often appear in the newspaper or in government office buildings. If you see any suspicious activities in or around your water supply, please notify the local authorities

A LETTER FROM THE REAL ESTATE TAX COLLECTOR

Unless it is an interim tax bill, all 2018 Real Estate Taxes are now due in the penalty amount. If taxes are not paid by the end of the year they will be turned over to Bucks County Tax Claim for collections. If paying after December 15th, only bank checks or certified checks will be accepted. Please contact me if you have not received a copy of your bill and I can email or mail you a copy.

Please keep in mind the due date for The Pennsylvania Property Tax/Rent Rebate program has been extended to December 31st which benefits eligible Pennsylvanians age 65 and older; widows and widowers age 50 and older; and people with disabilities age 18 and older. The income limit is \$35,000 a year for homeowners. Half of social security income is excluded. The rebates range from \$250-\$650. More information can be found at www.revenue.pa.gov or you can contact me and I can send you the information.
